Here are a selection of letters received by the community council from the children at the school.


Dear Community Council...

COMMUNITY COMPANY NEWS – November 2016

The AGM

The Annual General Meeting of the Ballachulish Community Company was held at 7pm. on Wednesday 9th November.

After the formalities, Jimmy Waugh gave his chairman's report. He reiterated that the sole purpose of the Community Company was for community benefit and that this had increasing scope, particularly in the light of new legislation emerging from the Scottish Government. He referenced the Laroch and Glenachulish hydro schemes; and while our initial path was stalled, all possible avenues for progress are still being explored. One that is of particular interest is a "community ownership share scheme" (see below).

Jimmy continued by mentioning the Community Asset Programme and its usefulness in such areas as possibly acquiring the old water treatment works for community use. He mentioned the importance of the Community Action Plan, as a catalyst for improvement in many aspects of village life.

Following elections, we will essentially continue with the same 9 directors as last year. Positions will be decided at the next meeting and be reported in the January Company newsletter.

Community Ownership Share Schemes

A presentation was given by Rory Dutton from Development Trusts Association Scotland. It appears that one way our hydro scheme could continue would be through a Community Ownership Share Scheme and this is something the board will actively consider. This model is used across the UK by local groups keen to develop all sorts of schemes, including power projects. See the website for more info: www.dtascot.org.uk

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LOCAL TRANSPORT NEWS

Notes from meeting on 1st November

Bus Services

Representatives from Citylink and Stagecoach were present and both were very happy to have a face to face meeting with local councilors and bus users. Some points that arose:

- They are going to look into the problem that a number of buses on the local 44 service terminate in Middle Street rather than at the bus station, causing problems for onward connections to the Citylink services and also for shoppers carrying shopping from the supermarkets.
- The Glasgow Citylink service operated by Shiel Buses was praised, whilst concerns were raised regarding the Inverness Citylink service operated by Stagecoach, particularly with catering for the disabled. Stagecoach promised to investigate, but said that the buses were 6 years old and not due for replacement yet. Our correspondent got the impression that the contract will be due for renewal soon and that only limited action will be taken until Stagecoach secure the renewal.
- A suggestion from the floor at the meeting, which was supported by Citylink, may see the Glasgow service rerouted via Callendar, to provide better access to Edinburgh in the winter months. However, this would be a longer journey and not pass the airport so some objections too. Please pass your views on this idea to the Transport Forum.
- Please contact Citylink or Stagecoach as soon as possible if you encounter any problems with their services, so that they can deal with them promptly.

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THE MUSEUM - 50 YEARS ON!

In 1966 the Scottish Women's Rural Institute (SWRI) had its Jubilee and institutes were invited to write their village history. The local group entered. They did not win an award but a great deal of local interest was generated by the project and the idea of a museum began.


Money was raised by ceilidhs; an appeal in the Oban Times and in local shops started a trickle of exhibits arriving. People also gave family stories and memories of local life in the past which became an important record of how people lived in the Highlands.

Although now usually known as The Glencoe Museum the original name was 'Glencoe and North Lorn Folk Museum' reflecting both the shared histories of people living in this part of the Highlands and the fact that donations came from all over North Lorn as well as far and wide. The items donated ranged from tiny to very large, from everyday objects to unique items of national importance. Donors regularly made comments like *'you'll look after it better than we can'* or *'these things will get lost forever unless someone preserves them'*. Fairly quickly the number of donated items rose and the late Mrs MacColl of Craigrannoch loaned one of her cottages in Glencoe to house the exhibits. The museum opened in June 1967 and charged 1/- (5p) entry.

At the heart of the museum has always been the desire to conserve the story of the people of the area, in particular the villages of Glencoe and Ballachulish. 50 years ago people in Ballachulish donated items of value and stories belonging to their families as the museum was the only place at the time with the ability to safeguard them. Ballachulish now hopes to establish its own Heritage Centre and the museum is keen to be involved in whatever ways it can be helpful.

2017 sees the Museum celebrating its 50th anniversary. We remain an independent museum with charitable status supported by Highland Council and employ a qualified Curator, ably assisted by the fantastic volunteers and seasonal staff. A long-held aspiration is to upgrade the museum buildings and improve access for all ages. We are currently mainly seen as a tourist destination but hope that we can encourage more local use with improved facilities.

The Board are looking to recruit new Trustees to help take us forward in the next stage; particularly people living locally. Whilst keen to have new trustees with

LIFE IN THE 1500'S

The next time you are washing your hands and complain because the water temperature isn't just how you like it, think about how things used to be.

Here are some facts about the 1500s:

Most people got married in June because they took their yearly bath in May and still smelled pretty good by June. However, they were starting to smell, so brides carried a bouquet of flowers to hide the body odour. Hence the custom today of carrying a bouquet when getting married.

Baths consisted of a big tub filled with hot water. The man of the house had the privilege of the nice clean water, then all the other sons and men, then the women and finally the children. Last of all the babies. By then the water was so dirty you could actually lose someone in it. Hence the saying, "Don't throw the baby out with the Bath Water.."

Houses had thatched roofs - thick straw - piled high, with no wood underneath. It was the only place for animals to get warm, so all the cats and other small animals (mice, bugs) lived in the roof. When it rained it became slippery and sometimes the animals would slip and fall off the roof. Hence the saying, "It's raining cats and dogs."

There was nothing to stop things from falling into the house. This posed a real problem in the bedroom where bugs and other droppings could mess up your nice clean bed. Hence, a bed with big posts and a sheet hung over the top afforded some protection. That's how canopy beds came into existence.

The floor was dirt. Only the wealthy had something other than dirt. Hence the saying, Dirt poor.

The wealthy had slate floors that would get slippery in the winter when wet, so they spread thresh (straw) on the floor to help keep their footing. As the winter wore on, they added more thresh until, when you opened the door, it would all start slipping outside. A piece of wood was placed in the entranceway. Hence the saying a thresh hold.

Defib Update

A few months ago the PPG embarked on a project to have defibrillators located at strategic points in the local area and embarked on a fund raising campaign to provide them. We are pleased to announce that two of these life-saving units will be available in the near future.

One will be positioned on the wall of the ambulance station in Glencoe and one on the medical centre wall in Ballachulish. The defibs will be housed in heated unlocked cabinets and will be available to anyone dealing with an emergency. Training in the use of the defibrillators and in general CPR techniques will be offered by the Scottish Ambulance Service.

The PPG is grateful for the support of the local community, local businesses, Glencoe and Ballachulish Community Councils, Highland Council, the Ambulance Service and the NHS for supporting this worthwhile project.

Tanya in the Pharmacy Says... Prescriptions: Help us to Help You!

My name is Tanya Stewart and I have recently taken over the running of the practice dispensary from Meg Harvey. I am a registered Pharmacy Technician and I have been working in pharmacies on the west coast since 2001.

Some people have asked why it takes so long for a prescription to be dispensed. The honest answer is all the stages the prescription has to go through. Once it is requested, it has to be authorised by a GP, dispensed and double checked before it can be collected. All of this does take time and on a busy day I've dispensed over 300 items!

Back to my main point, please don't run out! Many of the prescriptions I do are for repeat medicines for on-going conditions. For these to work most effectively it is important that they are taken regularly every day. So please make sure you order in plenty of time. A good guide is that most medicines come in strips of 10 or 14, so if you take one tablet daily, order when you are half way through your last strip and you will have enough tablets to use until your order is ready.

HELP - I've run out!

If you do run out of your medicines please let the surgery know ASAP. You will be able to pick up a signed prescription (GP10) which you can take to one of the pharmacies in Fort William.

If the surgery is closed, you may be able to obtain a supply from a pharmacy in Scotland through the 'unscheduled care' scheme. Please note not all medicines are available through this scheme. The pharmacist will ask you some questions and can only supply if you know the name and strength of your medicines so it's a good idea to have your repeat form with you to show them, they will then send the details of anything they supply to you through to the surgery.



WHAT'S GOING ON??

You may have heard rumours about various things happening in the community. This page hopes to give a brief outline of what projects are currently being progressed.

River Laroch Path

Many of you may be aware of the current condition of the Riverside Path from Albert Road to the Underpass, where the river has started eroding the bank quite badly. The community council are in discussion with a number of agencies to try and resolve this as soon as possible, with a proper long term solution.

In the meantime, can we ask that everyone takes care whilst using the path and that regular users inform both the community council and the Highland Council helpline - Highland Council Roads, flooding and street lighting - **01349 886690**, immediately if they consider the path to have become dangerous. Thank You.

Rhododendrons

The Rhododendron survey is ongoing around the village, and once completed we will be seeking volunteers to help with the removal of the invasive Ponticum variety. We hope to carry out the work later this year, and will provide further details in due course. Thank you to those who have helped so far.



Glencoe Orbital Path

The National Trust for Scotland have not managed to get outside funding to complete their section of the orbital path. They need a considerable amount of money to construct the footbridge, and so far are not prepared to commit the money from their own limited resources.

Burial Isle Tidy Up

In Summer 2016 Glencoe Heritage Trust embarked on a programme of intense ground maintenance on Eileen Munda with a view to continue into the Spring of 2017. It has already revealed long lost headstones with at least one of considerable age being uncovered.

However, comments have been made by visitors since that the view of the Island from the Information Viewpoint at the Isles of Glencoe pathway is obscured by the undergrowth surrounding the viewpoint and would like to see this rectified.

A book is available, produced by Alexander (Sander) MacDonald which contains detailed records of gravestone inscriptions. This currently costs £7.50 with all proceeds going to the Trust. For more information contact 01855 811490.

Croft Development

Back in November, there was a public meeting at the Village Hall regarding the possible future development of the top part of the Croft. The landowner, Charles Chisholm, was in attendance and answered a number of questions from the floor.

At present any development is only an idea, and it is unlikely that a planning application will be submitted until the end of this year at the earliest. Queries were raised about access, style of development and number of properties, but none of these matters have been finalised, as the plan is currently at the very early stages. The landowner pledged to fully involve the community at all stages of the development of the plans.

Quarry

There is still some work to complete within the Quarry, which will hopefully be done this spring.


One idea that the community council have to help improve the long term sustainability of the quarry is to install a 'donations box' at the Quarry entrance. There are a lot of tourists visiting the quarry each week, and small donations soon mount up. The money would be used to further the work that the community have already undertaken in improving the quarry and its surroundings for both the visitors and locals.

Any such Donation box would be emptied every day.
